19:58:54 From mcutifani: Thank you Father. Your perspective on a new model is very important. However, extractives are critical to creating a balanced and sustainable economy. We need extractives working in balance with the circular economy. So, not elimination of extractives, but in balance with recycling. A good example is how mining is critical to ensure agriculture productivity to feed people. Without mining we could only produce enough food to feed only half the people on the planet. The key question is how we balance these inputs with recycling to improve sustainability.

The international system is sadly failing to effectively stop conflicts and facilitate safe return in most cases. In the absence of real progress in building peace and ending persecution that causes people to flee their homes, it is critical that social and economic systems find ways of granting refugees greater protection, access to basic services and to allow refugees to contribute to the economies of their host countries. I speak here less about the EU and more from the context of the developing world where the vast majority of refugees are currently hosted. Both faith and business leaders have a huge role to play here, in encouraging and supporting governments of developing countries to include refugees in recovery and development plans.

Business abilities, which are a gift from God, should always be clearly directed to the development of others and to eliminating poverty, especially through the creation of diversified work opportunities. The right to private property is always accompanied by the primary and prior principle of the subordination of all private property to the universal destination of the earth's goods, and thus the right of all to their use.[103]
