International Participants



Jude Blanchette

Jude Blanchette holds the Freeman Chair in China Studies at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). Previously, he was engagement director at The Conference Board's China Center for Economics and Business in Beijing, where he researched China's political environment with a focus on the workings of the Communist Party of China and its impact on foreign companies and investors. Prior to working at The Conference Board, Blanchette was the assistant director of the 21st Century China Center at the University of California, San Diego.

Blanchette has written for a range of publications, including Foreign Affairs and Foreign Policy, and his Chinese translations have appeared in the Wall Street Journal and the Financial Times. His book, China's New Red Guards: The Return of Radicalism and the Rebirth of Mao Zedong, was published by Oxford University Press in 2019.

Blanchette is a public intellectual fellow at the National Committee on United States-China Relations and serves on the board of the American Mandarin Society. He is also a senior advisor at Crumpton Group, a geopolitical risk advisory based in Arlington, Virginia. He holds an M.A. in modern Chinese studies from the University of Oxford and a B.A. in economics from Loyola University in Maryland.



Jennifer Zhihuan Huang Bouey

Jennifer Zhihuan Huang Bouey is a senior policy researcher and the Tang Chair for China Policy Studies at the RAND Corporation. She leads wide-ranged collaborative research initiatives on health, education, and global developments. In the last two years, Dr. Bouey has testified multiple times before Congress, briefed U.S. government officials, and was guoted frequently on China's global health initiatives and US-China public health collaborations by main media channels. Prior to joining RAND, she led an international research workgroup on U.S. and China's health security interests, including pandemic preparedness and global health governance. Dr. Bouey also serve as a professor of policy analysis at RAND Pardee Graduate School and associate professor of global health at the Georgetown University. Her research centered on migrant health and social determinants of health and many projects were funded by NIH, HRSA/HHS, and foundations. Dr. Bouey routinely provide consultations for the World Bank Group, UNAIDS, USAID, Hong Kong Government AIDS Fund, and international NGOs.



Joseph DeTrani

Joseph DeTrani was the U.S. Special Envoy for the Six-Party Talks with North Korea and the U.S. representative to the Korea Energy Development Organization. He was an Associate Director of National Intelligence and Mission Manager for North Korea and the Director of the National Counter Proliferation Center, while also serving as a Special Adviser to the Director of National Intelligence. After government service, he was the President of the Intelligence and National Security Alliance (INSA), a professional think tank and President of the Daniel Morgan Graduate School of National Security.

Currently, he is on the Board of Managers at Sandia National Laboratories and is a Senior Advisor at Oak Ridge National Laboratories and a professor at Missouri State University's Graduate Department of Security and Strategic Studies. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and the National Committee on North Korea, a Fellow at the Institute of Korean-American Studies and a Rochester Institute of Technology/National Institute of the Deaf Foundation Board member.

Ambassador DeTrani served over two decades with the Central Intelligence Agency as a member of the Senior Executive Service, with overseas assignments in East Asia and domestically as Director of Technical Services, Director of European Operations, Director of Public Affairs, Director of East Asia Operations and Director of the Crime and Narcotics Center.

Ambassador DeTrani was an officer in the Air Force and graduated with honors from New York University (NYU).He attended NYU School of Law and Graduate School of Business Administration.



Rafiq Dossani

Rafiq Dossani is director of the RAND Center for Asia Pacific Policy, a senior economist at the RAND Corporation, and a professor at the Pardee RAND Graduate School. He works on regional development, security, finance, education, and technology issues. Recent projects include the Belt and Road Initiative, modes of engagement with North Korea, Asian regional trade, the digital divide in early childhood education, smart city development in China, India's service sector, academic medical centers in China, and the use of artificial intelligence in elder home-based health care.

Previously, Dossani was director of Stanford University's Center for South Asia, and a senior research scholar at Stanford University's Institute for International Studies. He holds a Ph.D. in finance from Northwestern University, an M.B.A. from the Indian Institute of Management, Calcutta, and a B.A. in economics from St. Stephen's College, Delhi.

In 2017, Dossani received the Exemplary Performance award from the South Asian Studies Association for lifetime scholastic contributions to South Asian studies.



Karl W. Eikenberry

Karl Eikenberry is a former U.S. Ambassador to Afghanistan and Lieutenant General, U.S. Army (retired). He is a faculty member of Schwarzman College, Tsinghua University, Non-Resident Fellow at the Liechtenstein Institute on Self Determination at Princeton University, and Board Member of the Centre for Humanitarian Dialogue in Geneva, Switzerland.

Previously he was the Director of the U.S.-Asia Security Initiative at the Walter H. Shorenstein Asia-Pacific Research Center, Stanford University.

Prior to his arrival at Stanford, he served as the U.S. Ambassador to Afghanistan from 2009 until 2011. Before appointment as Chief of Mission in Kabul, Ambassador Eikenberry had a thirty-five-year career in the United States Army, retiring in April 2009 with the rank of lieutenant general. His military operational posts included commander and staff officer with mechanized, light, airborne, and ranger infantry units in the continental U.S., Hawaii, Korea, Italy, and in Afghanistan as the Commander of the American-led Coalition forces. He held various policy and political-military positions, including Deputy Chairman of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) Military Committee in Brussels, Belgium; Director for Strategic Planning and Policy for U.S. Pacific Command at Camp Smith, Hawaii; U.S. Security Coordinator and Chief of the Office of Military Cooperation in Kabul, Afghanistan; and Assistant Army and later Defense Attaché at the United States Embassy in Beijing, China.



Danit Gal

Danit Gal is an Associate Fellow at the Leverhulme Centre for the Future of Intelligence at the University of Cambridge, and Visiting Research Fellow at the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies at the Nanyang Technological University. Previously, she was Project Assistant Professor at the Cyber Civilizations Research Center at Keio University in Tokyo, Japan, Yenching Scholar at Peking University and International Strategic Advisor to the iCenter at Tsinghua University in Beijing, China. Danit is the vice-chair the IEEE P7009 Standard on the Fail-Safe Design of Autonomous and Semi-Autonomous Systems working group and a member of the Executive Committee of The IEEE Global Initiative on Ethics of Autonomous and Intelligent Systems. In addition, she serves as a Founding Editor and Editorial Board Member of Springer's AI and Ethics journal, an Executive Committee Member of the AI4SDGs Cooperation Network at the Beijing Academy of AI, and an Advisory Board Member of UKRI's Trustworthy Autonomous Systems Verifiability Node.



Nils Gilman

Nils Gilman is the Vice President of Programs at the Berggruen Institute, in which capacity he leads the Institute's research program, directs its resident fellowship program, and is also Deputy Editor of Noema Magazine. He has previously worked as Associate Chancellor at the University of California Berkeley, as Research Director and scenario planning consultant at the Monitor Group and Global Business Network, and at various enterprise software companies including Salesforce.com and BEA Systems. Gilman has won the Sidney Award (for long-form journalism) from the New York Times and an Albie Award (for international political economy) from The Washington Post.

He is the author of Mandarins of the Future: Modernization Theory in Cold War America (2004) and Deviant Globalization: Black Market Economy in the 21st Century (2011) as well as numerous articles on intellectual history and political economy. He holds a B.A. M.A. and Ph.D. in History from U.C. Berkeley.



David Gordon

David Gordon is Senior Advisor for Geo-economics and strategy at the International Institute for Strategic Studies (IISS), where he leads the Institute's multi-year project on China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI). He is also Senior Advisor at the Eurasia Group, where he was formerly the firm's Chairman.

From 2007 to 2009, David served as the director of policy planning under Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice. He played a leading role in developing policy ideas for Rice on issues ranging from Afghanistan and Pakistan to US engagement in East Asia to the multilateral response to the international financial crisis. He also led the department's strategic policy dialogues with more than 20 countries around the globe, including China. Gordon was deputy to Ambassador John Negroponte in the Strategic Dialogue with China in 2007-8.

Prior to his work with the State Department, Gordon was Vice-Chair of the US National Intelligence Council (NIC). He provided analytic leadership for the NIC's ground-breaking reports, Global Trends 2015 and Global Trends 2020. David received his doctorate from the University of Michigan and has taught at the College of William and Mary, Princeton University, Georgetown University, and the University of Nairobi. Stephen Hadley is a principal of Rice, Hadley, Gates & Manuel LLC, an international strategic consulting firm founded with Condoleezza Rice, Robert Gates, and Anja Manuel. Mr. Hadley is also Board Chair of the United States Institute of Peace (USIP) and an Executive Vice Chair of the Board of Directors of the Atlantic Council. Mr. Hadley served for four years as the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs from 2005 to 2009. From 2001 to 2005, Mr. Hadley was the Assistant to the President and Deputy National Security Advisor, serving under then National Security Advisor Condoleezza Rice. Mr. Hadley had previously served on the National Security Council staff and in the Defense Department including as Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Policy from 1989 to 1993. During his professional career, Mr. Hadley has served on a number of corporate and advisory boards, including: the National Security Advisory Panel to the Director of Central Intelligence, the Department of Defense Policy Board, and the State Department's Foreign Affairs policy Board. He is a member of the Aspen Strategy Group.





Kate Hampton

Kate Hampton became CEO of the Children's Investment Fund Foundation in March 2016, having run CIFF's Climate Change team since 2009.

Current voluntary board and advisory roles include the European Climate Foundation, Observer Research Foundation (India), the China Council for International Cooperation on Environment and Development (CCICED) and its Special Policy Study on Global Climate Governance and China's Role, the Open Political Economy Network (OPEN), the Smith School of Enterprise and the Environment (University of Oxford), We Protect Global Alliance, Friend of COP26, and Unilever's Sustainable Living Plan Advisory Council.

Kate's career spans roles in government, finance, consulting, a think tank and NGOs, including at Climate Change Capital, where she was Head of Policy. She has also advised policy makers in several roles, including as Senior Policy Advisor for the United Kingdom's G8 and EU presidencies in 2005. In 2008, Kate was named a World Economic Forum Young Global Leader. She holds a BSc from the London School of Economics and a Master in Public Policy from the Harvard Kennedy School.



Steve Howard

As Founding Secretary General of the non-profit Global Foundation, Steve Howard has led the necessary global push for the adoption of 'co-operative globalisation', a positive strategy for inclusive, 'win-win' economic development and a sustainable global economy. Many world leaders, including Pope Francis, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Christine Lagarde, Pascal Lamy and Mark Carney, have personally participated in and endorsed this and related initiatives.

He led the successful renaissance strategy for Melbourne, in Australia in the 1990's, including a national strategy for private sector investment in public infrastructure, now adopted as a business model, worldwide. He continues to advise on complex infrastructure projects and funds in emerging markets.

In 1998, he co-founded and has since led the Global Foundation, for which an early centerpiece was the restoration of relations between Australia and the European Union and France, in particular.

Steve is respected in China for his contribution to China's global engagement over the past 20 years. Highlights have included: his role in bringing China, the US and Australia together on global climate change policy; and more recently, his integral role in the establishment of the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank, the first international institution led by China. He visits China regularly for high-level dialogues embracing security, international relations and multilateral economic development.

Steve completed his Degree in Social Science at Deakin University and the Senior Executive Program at London Business School, under a British Government scholarship. He was awarded the Chevalier of the Order of Merit for his contribution to France-Australia relations in 2004.



Ken Jimbo

Ken Jimbo is Professor at the Faculty of Policy Management, Keio University. He is concurrently an adjunct Senior Research Fellow at the Canon Institute for Global Studies (CIGS) and the Tokyo Foundation (TKFD). He coordinates Japan-U.S. Military Statesman Forum (MSF) as an Executive Director. He served as a Special Advisor to the Minister of Defense, Japan Ministry of Defense (2020) and a Senior Advisor, The National Security Secretariat (2018-20).

His main research fields are in International Security, Japan-US Security Relations, Japanese Foreign and Defense Policy, Multilateral Security in Asia-Pacific, and Regionalism in East Asia. He has been a policy advisor at various Japanese governmental commissions and research groups including at the National Security Secretariat, the Ministry of Defense and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. His policy writings have appeared in NBR, The RAND Corporation, Stimson Center, Pacific Forum CSIS, Japan Times, Nikkei, Yomiuri, Asahi and Sankei Shimbun.





Sergey Karaganov

Sergey Karaganov is Dr. Hab (History), Scientific Head and Dean of the Faculty (School) of International Economics and Foreign Affairs of the National Research University Higher School of Economics, Honorary Chairman of the Presidium of the Council on Foreign and Defense Policy. He has authored and edited more than 25 books and around 500 articles. Some of his positions include: Member of the Academic Council of the MFA of Russia, Member of the Academic and Advisory Council, Russian Security Council, Member of the Council for the Development of Civil Society and Human Rights under the President of Russia. In 1990s he was the member of the Presidential Council of Russia. In 2014-2015 Sergey Karaganov was a member of the High-level Panel of Eminent Persons on European Security as a Common Project under the OSCE.





Arthur Kroeber

Arthur Kroeber co-founded the China-focused research service Dragonomics in Beijing in 2002 and was the editor of its flagship journal China Economic Quarterly through 2017. Since Dragonomics' 2011 merger with Gavekal he has been head of research for the combined operation. Before founding Dragonomics, he spent 15 years as journalist specializing in Asian economic affairs, and reported from China, India, Pakistan and other Asian countries. He is also an Adjunct Professor of Economics at the NYU Stern School of Business, a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and of the National Committee on US-China Relations, and a senior non-resident fellow of the Brookings-Tsinghua Center in Beijing. His book "China's Economy: What Everyone Needs to Know" was published by Oxford University Press in 2016, with a second edition in 2020, and is widely used in university classrooms.





Cliff Kupchan

Cliff Kupchan is Eurasia Group's chairman, as well as director of research and leader of the firm's global macro coverage. Cliff has held high-level positions in the US government and regularly meets top foreign leaders. He provides cutting-edge insights on political risk. Cliff has been a leading expert on international relations for more than two decades—in academia, as a US official, and in the private sector—and he speaks frequently to public and private sector audiences. Cliff often appears on major TV networks and is frequently quoted in the world's leading newspapers. He has published extensively in academic journals and frequently authors op-eds. Lee Dongmin is an Associate Professor of Political Science and International Relations at Dankook University in Korea. He received a Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Colorado at Boulder, USA. Prior to returning to Korea, he served as an Assistant Professor at the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS), Nanyang Technological University in Singapore. Dr. Lee's research interests include international security with an empirical focus on China, and Northeast Asia. He has contributed to the academic journals such as Armed Forces & Society, Defence Studies, Korean Journal of Defense Analysis. Dr. Lee served as a visiting fellow at various institutes including Beijing University (IISS), Renmin University (SIS), National Chengchi University (IIR), and the East-West Center (EWC) in the United States.



Alex Lennon

Alexander T. J. Lennon is the editor-in-chief of The Washington Quarterly, focusing on global strategic trends and their public policy implications, and a Professorial Lecturer (part-time faculty) teaching US Grand Strategy at The Elliott School of International Affairs at George Washington University. Lennon focuses on the grand strategy and foreign and security policies of contemporary major powers-especially the United States and China-as well as nuclear security strategy. He has completed projects on the national security implications of global climate change, and the regional risks of proliferation from Iran and North Korea. Lennon has edited or coedited seven books, published numerous articles and opeds, and has been interviewed frequently by the media. He is a life member of the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR) and the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia-Pacific (CSCAP). Lennon holds a Ph.D. from the University of Maryland, where his dissertation was on the role of track-two networks in U.S. nonproliferation policy, an M.A. in national security studies from Georgetown University, and an A.B. cum laude from Harvard University, where he was the national policy debate (NDT) champion.



Cheng Li

Cheng Li is Director and Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution's John L. Thornton China Center. Dr. Li is also a director of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, a Distinguished Fellow of the Munk School of Global Affairs and Public Policy at University of Toronto, a nonresident fellow at Yale University's Paul Tsai China Center, and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. Li's research areas include the transformation of political leaders, generational change, the Chinese middle class, technological development in China, and U.S.-China relations.



Bonny Lin

Bonny Lin is a political scientist at the RAND Corporation. Her research focuses on U.S. defense policy towards China, India, and the Indo-Pacific region. Her most recent works examine U.S.-China competition for influence in the Indo-Pacific, China's use of gray zone tactics, and U.S. strategies towards China. Dr. Lin served in the Office of the Secretary of Defense from 2015 to 2018, where she was the senior advisor for China and director for Taiwan and was awarded a Medal of Exceptional Public Service. Prior to joining RAND, she worked at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, the Center for Strategic and International Studies, and the World Bank. Dr. Lin holds a Ph.D. in political science from Yale University, an M.A. in Asian studies (China) from the University of Michigan, and a B.A. in government from Harvard University.



Michael McFaul

Michael McFaul is the Director and Senior Fellow at the Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies; the Ken Olivier and Angela Nomellini Professor of International Studies in Political Science; and the Peter and Helen Bing Senior Fellow at the Hoover Institution, all at Stanford University. He was also the Distinguished Mingde Faculty Fellow at the Stanford Center at Peking University from June to August of 2015. He joined the Stanford faculty in 1995. Ambassador McFaul is also an analyst for NBC News and a contributing columnist to The Washington Post.

Ambassador McFaul served for five years in the Obama administration, first as Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for Russian and Eurasian Affairs at the National Security Council at the White House (2009-2012), and then as U.S. Ambassador to the Russian Federation (2012-2014). He has authored several books, including most recently the New York Times bestseller, From Cold War to Hot Peace: An American Ambassador in Putin's Russia. He is currently writing a book on great powers relations in the 21st century.



Robin Niblett

Robin Niblett CMG became the Director and Chief Executive of Chatham House (the Royal Institute of International Affairs) in January 2007. From 2001 to 2006, Dr Niblett was the Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of Washington-based Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). During his last two years at CSIS, he also served as Director of the CSIS Europe Programme and its Initiative for a Renewed Transatlantic Partnership.

Dr Niblett is an expert on UK foreign policy, European political and economic security and transatlantic relations.

He is currently co-Chair of the World Economic Forum's Global Futures Council on Geopolitics and has served as the Chair of its Global Agenda Council on Europe (2012-13). He was a Special Adviser to the House of Commons Foreign Affairs Committee (2015-17) and Chairman of the Experts Group for the 2014 NATO Summit; He was Chair of the British Academy's Steering Committee of Languages for Security Project (2013). From January 2010–May 2020, he was a Non-Executive Director of Fidelity European Values Investment Trust.

He became a Companion of St Michael and St George (CMG) in 2015.



Douglas Paal

Douglas H. Paal is a distinguished fellow at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He previously served as vice chairman of JPMorgan Chase International (2006–2008) and was an unofficial U.S. representative to Taiwan as director of the American Institute in Taiwan (2002–2006). He was on the National Security Council staffs of Presidents Reagan and George H. W. Bush between 1986 and 1993 as director of Asian Affairs and then as senior director and special assistant to the president.

Paal held positions in the policy planning staff at the State Department, as a senior analyst for the CIA, and at U.S. embassies in Singapore and Beijing. He has spoken and published frequently on Asian affairs and national security issues.





Richard Sakwa

Richard Sakwa is Professor of Russian and European Politics at the University of Kent at Canterbury, a Senior Research Fellow at the National Research University-Higher School of Economics in Moscow and an Honorary Professor in the Faculty of Political Science at Moscow State University. After graduating in History from the London School of Economics, he took a PhD from the Centre for Russian and East European Studies (CREES) at the University of Birmingham. He held lectureships at the Universities of Essex and California, Santa Cruz, before joining the University of Kent in 1987. He has published widely on Soviet, Russian and post-communist affairs. Recent books include Putin Redux: Power and Contradiction in Contemporary Russia (London and New York, Routledge, 2014), Frontline Ukraine: Crisis in the Borderlands (London, I. B. Tauris, 2016), Russia against the Rest: The Post-Cold War Crisis of World Order (Cambridge University Press, 2017) and Russia's Futures (Cambridge, Polity, 2019). His latest book is The Putin Paradox, published by I. B. Tauris (Bloomsbury) in 2020. His book Deception: Russiagate and the New Cold War is due out with Lexington Books by the end of 2021. He is currently working on The Lost Peace: The Second Cold War and the Making of a New Global Conflict for Yale University Press.



Andrew Scobell

Andrew Scobell is Senior Political Scientist at the RAND Corporation. His publications include: Command and Control in U.S. Naval Competition with China (RAND, 2020), China's Grand Strategy (RAND, 2020) Chairman Xi Remakes the PLA (National Defense University Press, 2019), At the Dawn of Belt and Road (RAND, 2018), PLA Influence on China's National Security Policymaking (Stanford University Press, 2015), China's Search for Security (Columbia University Press, 2012), and China's Use of Military Force (Cambridge University Press, 2003). Scobell earned a doctorate in political science from Columbia University.



Michael Swaine

Michael Swaine is Director of East Asia Program at Quincy Institute for Responsible Statecraft.

Michael Swaine is one the most prominent American analysts in Chinese security studies. Formerly a senior fellow at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace for nearly 20 years and before that a senior policy analyst at the RAND Corporation for many years, Swaine is a specialist in Chinese defense and foreign policy, U.S. –China relations, and East Asian international relations. He has authored and edited more than a dozen books and monographs and many journal articles and book chapters in these areas, directs security-related projects with Chinese partners, and advises the U.S. government on Asian security issues. He received his Ph.D. in government from Harvard University.



Max Tegmark

Max Tegmark is a professor doing AI and physics research at MIT as part of the Institute for Artificial Intelligence & Fundamental Interactions and the Center for Brains, Minds and Machines. He advocates for positive use of technology as president of the Future of Life Institute. He is the author of over 250 publications as well as the New York Times bestsellers "Life 3.0: Being Human in the Age of Artificial Intelligence" and "Our Mathematical Universe: My Quest for the Ultimate Nature of Reality". His AI research focuses on intelligible intelligence.



John L. Thornton

John L. Thornton is Executive Chairman of Barrick Gold Corporation. He is Chair Emeritus of the Brookings Institution, Co-Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Asia Society, and a Professor and Director of the Global Leadership Program at the Tsinghua University School of Economics and Management in Beijing. Mr. Thornton retired in 2003 as President and a member of the board of the Goldman Sachs Group.

Mr. Thornton is a director of the Ford Motor Company and of SparkCognition, the leading industrial AI company in the world. He is also Non-Executive Chairman of PineBridge Investments and Chairman of Silk Road Finance Corporation. He is the Vice Chairman of the Board of Morehouse College and a trustee, advisory board member or member of the China Investment Corporation (CIC), King Abdullah University of Science and Technology, McKinsey Advisory Council and Schwarzman Scholars.

In 2007, Institutional Investor Magazine named Mr. Thornton as one of 40 individuals who had the greatest influence in shaping global financial markets over the previous forty years. He was a recipient in 2008 of the Friendship Award of the People's Republic of China, the highest honor accorded to a non-Chinese citizen. The Chinese government also named him as one of fifteen 'foreign experts' who had made the most significant contribution to China's development over the previous three decades.

Mr. Thornton received an A.B. in history from Harvard College, a B.A./M.A. in jurisprudence from Oxford University and an M.P.P.M. from the Yale School of Management. Mr. Thornton was elected a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2007 and an Honorary Fellow of St. John's College, Oxford University in 2009.





Laurence Tubiana

Laurence Tubiana is CEO of the European Climate Foundation (ECF). In addition to her role at ECF, she is the Chair of the Board of Governors at the French Development Agency (AFD), and a Professor at Sciences Po, Paris. Before joining ECF, Laurence was France's Climate Change Ambassador and Special Representative for COP21, and as such a key architect of the landmark Paris Agreement. Following COP21, she was appointed High Level Champion for climate action.

Laurence brings decades of expertise. From 1997—2002, she served as Senior Adviser on the Environment to the French Prime Minister Lionel Jospin. From 2009—2010, she created and led the newly established Directorate for Global Public Goods at the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs. She founded in 2002 and directed until 2014 the Institute of Sustainable Development and International Relations (IDDRI). She has held academic positions including Sciences Po and as Professor of International Affairs at Columbia University. She has been a member of numerous boards and scientific committees, including the Chinese Committee on the Environment and International Development (CCICED).



Michael Vatikiotis

Michael Vatikiotis is the Asia Regional Director for the Geneva based Centre for Humanitarian Dialogue. Based in Singapore, he works on promoting dialogue and conflict resolution in Asia and has over a decade of experience working to mitigate conflicts in Indonesia, Thailand and Myanmar as well as the Philippines. Formerly a BBC Correspondent and editor of the Far Eastern Economic Review, Vatikiotis has been a writer, broadcaster and journalist in Asia for thirty-five years. With family origins in the Middle East, he has lived in Egypt, Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand as well as Hong Kong. His latest book is "Blood and Silk: Power and Conflict in Modern Southeast Asia." He is a regular broadcaster and contributor to the opinion page of several newspapers. Vatikiotis is a graduate of the School of Oriental and African Studies in London, earned his doctorate, which was on Thailand, from Oxford University, and was awarded an honorary doctorate from the University of Maryland. He is a member of the Asia Society's International Council. He speaks the Thai and Indonesian languages fluently. He is currently writing a study of cosmopolitanism in the Middle East seen through the lens of his family.





Richard Weitz

Richard Weitz is Senior Fellow and Director of the Center for Political-Military Analysis at Hudson Institute. His current research includes regional security developments relating to Europe, Eurasia, and East Asia as well as U.S. foreign and defense policies. Before joining Hudson in 2005, Dr. Weitz worked for several other academic and professional research institutions and the U.S. Department of Defense, where he received an Award for Excellence from Office of the Secretary of Defense. Dr. Weitz is a graduate of Harvard University (Ph.D. in Political Science), Oxford University (M.Phil. in Politics), the London School of Economics (M.Sc. in International Relations), and Harvard College (B.A. with Highest Honors in Government), where he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He is proficient in Russian, French, and German.



Odd Arne Westad

Odd Arne Westad is the Elihu Professor of History and Global Affairs at Yale University, where he teaches in the history department and in the Jackson Institute of Global Affairs. Previously, he was the S.T. Lee Professor of US-Asia Relations at Harvard University, teaching in the Kennedy School of Government. He is an expert on contemporary international history and on the eastern Asian region. Westad has been named one of the LSDP Top 100 Global Thinkers, mainly for his work on linking policymaking to an understanding of history.

At Yale, Professor Westad teaches courses on global and international history, on global power shifts, and on China's role in world affairs.

Professor Westad won the Bancroft Prize for The Global Cold War: Third World Interventions and the Making of Our Times. The book, which has been translated into fifteen languages, also won a number of other awards. Westad is also the general editor of the three-volume Cambridge History of the Cold War, as well as author of the Penguin History of the World (now in its 6th edition). Restless Empire: China and the World since 1750, was released in the US and UK in 2012 and made two Top 100 lists for that year. The book won the prestigious Bernard Schwartz Book Award from the Asia Society, awarded annually for outstanding contributions to the understanding of contemporary Asia or U.S.-Asia relations. His most recent book, The Cold War: A World History, was published in 2017 by Basic Books in the United States and Penguin in the UK.



Jonathan Woetzel

Jonathan Woetzel is a senior partner with McKinsey & Company based in Shanghai. In his 30 years with the Firm, Jonathan has advised clients in a range of industries – including energy, materials, technology and industrial – helping transform local companies into global leaders, and developing policy recommendations for government. Dr. Woetzel has led McKinsey's Asia Energy and Materials practice, the McKinsey Global Institute, McKinsey's macroeconomic research institute, in Asia, and its Corporate Finance practice in China. He led the establishment of McKinsey's China practice in the 1990s including managing its Shanghai location. He is the Co-Chair of the Urban China Initiative, a research collaboration with Tsinghua University. Dr. Woetzel has written five books on China including Capitalist China: Strategies for a Revolutionized Economy (Wiley & Sons, 2004), coauthored with Jimmy Hexter Operation China: From Strategy to Execution (Harvard Business Press, 2008) and co-authored with Jeffrey Towson The 1 Hour China and with James Manyika and Richard Dobbs No Ordinary Disruption (Public Affairs, 2015). He currently has 3 Amazon international business bestsellers. He holds a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Southern California, where his work focused on China's political economy. He is an honorary lecturer at Jiao Tong University Antai Business School, Peking University Guanghua Business School and China Europe International Business School. Dr. Woetzel, a U.S. citizen, is proficient in Mandarin, Spanish, and German. He lives in Shanghai.



Ngaire Woods

Ngaire Woods is the founding Dean of the Blavatnik School of Government and Professor of Global Economic Governance at Oxford University. Her research focuses on how to enhance the governance of organizations, the challenges of globalization, global development and the role of international institutions and global economic governance. She founded the Global Economic Governance Programme at Oxford University, and co-founded (with Robert O. Keohane) the Oxford-Princeton Global Leaders Fellowship programme. She led the creation of the Blavatnik School of Government.

Ngaire Woods serves as a member of the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank's International Advisory Panel, and on the Boards of the Mo Ibrahim Foundation and the Stephen A. Schwarzman Education Foundation. She is an Independent Non-Executive Director at Rio Tinto (effective September 2020). She sits on the advisory boards of the Centre for Global Development, the African Leadership Institute, the School of Management and Public Policy at Tsinghua University, and the Nelson Mandela School of Public Policy at Cape Town University. She is Chair of the Harvard University Visiting Committee on International Engagement and sits on the Harvard Kennedy School Visiting Committee. She is a member of the UK Government National Leadership Centre's Expert Advisory Panel, and of the Department for International Trade's Trade and Economy Panel. She is an honorary governor of the Ditchley Foundation.



Thomas Wright

Thomas Wright is director for the Center on the United States and Europe and a senior fellow in the Project on International Order and Strategy at the Brookings Institution. Previously, he was executive director of studies at the Chicago Council on Global Affairs and a lecturer at the Harris School of Public Policy at the University of Chicago. He has a Ph.D. from Georgetown University, an M.Phil. from Cambridge University, and a B.A. and M.A. from University College Dublin. He is the author of the book All Measures Short of War: The Contest for the 21st Century and the Future of American Power (Yale University Press, 2017).

CHEN Qi

Chen Qi is Professor of International Relations in the School of Social Sciences at Tsinghua University and Chief Expert for Key Programs of China's National Social Science Fund. He serves as Secretary General of the Center for International Security and Strategy and Chair of the Academic Committee of the Belt and Road Strategy Institute, both at Tsinghua University. Chen is also a member of the Expert Committee of the China Committee of 100 of Digital Economy. He is a Senior Advisor for AI governance for the Ministry of Industry and Information Technology of China and for foreign aid policy for the China International Development Cooperation Agency. He also serves China's National Social Science Fund as a reviewer and sits on the expert group for the UN Commission on Human Security. Chen is a Resident Scholar at the Carnegie-Tsinghua Center for Global Policy and runs the Center's US-China Track II Dialogue.



CHEN Xiaogong

Chen Xiaogong is a Lieutenant General (retired); Academic Committee Member, CISS, Tsinghua University.

He graduates from the Jilin University and the People's Liberation Army Military Academy. He served successively as Defense attaché in Chinese Embassy in Egypt and in the U.S.A from 1998 to 2003. He worked in the position of the Deputy Director-General of the Foreign Affairs Office of the Central Commission of CPC from 2003 to 2006. CUI Hongjian

Cui has been working on International Politics and China's Foreign Policy, European economy, politics, security and China-Europe relations, NATO and Regional Security, published plenty of articles, policy reports and comments.





DA Wei

Da Wei is a senior research fellow at Center for International Security and Strategy and professor of the department of International Relations, Tsinghua University. His research expertise covers China-US relations and US security & foreign policy.

Prior to current positions, Dr. Da Wei used to be an assistant president of University of International Relations (UIR), director of the Institute of American Studies, China Institutes of Contemporary International Relations (CICIR). Da Wei has written hundreds of policy papers to Chinese government, and published dozens of academic papers on journals in China, the US and other countries.

FAN Jishe

Fan Jishe is a professor in the Institute for International Strategic Studies at Party School of the Central Committee of C.P.C. (National Academy of Governance); Senior Fellow, CISS, Tsinghua University; From July 1997 to August 2019, He was Senior Fellow and Director of Strategic Studies and Deputy Director of the Center for Arms Control and Nonproliferation Studies in the Institute of American Studies at Chinese Academy of Social Sciences. He was the founding Executive Editor-in-Chief of the Contemporary of American Review journal. His research interests mainly include Sino-US strategic security relationship, American arms control and nonproliferation policies. He published widely in academic journals, edited volumes, and conference proceedings. He recently authored and edited four books on American military strategy, arms control policy, and nuclear strategies. He obtained his PHD from the Graduate School of Chinese Academy of Social Sciences in 2004, and spent about two years in total in Harvard University, Stanford University, Monterey Institute of International Studies as visiting scholar.



FU Ying

Fu Ying is the Chairperson of Center for International Security and Strategy, Tsinghua University (CISS). She is Vice-Chairperson of the Foreign Affairs Committee of China's 13th National People's Congress (NPC). She started her career with China's Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA) in 1978 and had long engaged in Asian affairs. She served successively as Director of Division and Counselor in Asian Affairs Department of MFA. In 1992 She joined UN peacekeeping mission in Cambodia. She was appointed Minister Counselor at Chinese Embassy in Indonesia in 1997, Chinese Ambassador to the Philippines in 1998, and Director General of Asian Department of MFA in 2000. She then was appointed Ambassador to Australia (2004-2007), and Ambassador to the United Kingdom (2007-2009). She served as Vice Minister of Foreign Affairs for European Affairs and then for Asian Affairs (2009-2013). Fu Ying was elected deputy to China's 12th (2013) and then 13th (2018) NPC and served as Chairperson of the Foreign Affairs Committee and spokesperson of the 12th NPC (2013-2018). She took on her current NPC position in 2018.



GAO Xiang

Gao Xiang, professor, Division Director of International Policy Research, National Center for Climate Change Strategy and International Cooperation (NCSC), Ministry of Ecology and Environment of China. He received his Ph.D. degree in environmental sciences from Fudan University in 2008. GAO's research interest focuses on climate change policies and global climate governance. He has undertaken more than 20 research projects supported by the National Natural Science Foundation of China etc., and co-authored 6 books and more than 30 papers in peer reviewed journals and books. GAO has participated in the UNFCCC negotiation since 2009 as a member of the China delegation, and in UN CBD negotiation since 2019. GAO has served as Co-Facilitator to the UN negotiation on transparency issues under the Paris Agreement since 2016, and as a member of the Compliance Committee of the Kyoto Protocol since 2014.



HU Bo

SHI Yinhong

Shi Yinhong is distinguished Professor of International Relations. Chairman of Academic Committee of the School for International Studies, and Director of the Center on American Studies at Renmin University of China in Beijing. He has served as a Counsellor to the State Council of People's Republic of China since February 2011. His previous positions include Professor of International History at Nanjing University and Professor of International Relations at International Relations Academy, Nanjing. He also served as President of American Historical Research Association of China from 1996 to 2002. He taught graduate courses as Visiting Professor of Public Policy three times at University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, and Visiting Professor of Modern China Studies at Aichi University in Nagoya. He received a Ph.D. in international history from Nanjing University in 1988. He mainly engages in history and ideas of international politics, strategic studies, East Asia security and foreign policies of both China and the United States. He has published eighteen books, more than 630 professional articles and essays, as well as nineteen translated books mainly on strategic history and international politics.





TENG Fei

Fei Teng is now an associate professor and deputy director of Institute of Energy, Environment and Economy in Tsinghua University. His research interests include energy and climate policy analysis using modeling tools, and international climate regime. He received his bachelor degrees in Mechanical Engineering and Applied Mathematics from Tsinghua University in 1998, and his MSc and Ph.D. in Management Science in School of Public Policy and Management at Tsinghua University in 2003. He finished his postdoc research in ENSIC/CNRS, Nancy in the year 2004.

His research supported China's preparation and submission on 2050 low emission development strategy, emission peaking NDC before the Paris Agreement and submission of NAMAs before Copenhagen. He serves as a lead author of IPCC 5th and 6th assessment report in WG III. He is the lead author of Second, Third and Fourth China's National Assessment Report on Climate Change, member of drafting team for several vital national documents, including National Plan on Climate Change and White Paper on Climate Change.

He served as advisory experts for China's negotiation team under UNFCCC from 2007 and 2017. He was the chief negotiator for transparency in Chinese delegation from the year 2009 to 2016. He is also a member of the BASIC expert group in BASIC ministerial meeting since 2011 and advisory experts for LMDC countries and second-track dialogue between China-India, China-EU, China-UK, and China-US. He served as the Chair of Consultative Group of Experts (CGE) under UNFCCC in 2013 to help developing countries to increase their reporting capacity on climate change.



WANG Dong

Wang Dong is Full Professor with tenure at School of International Studies, Peking University. Prof. Wang also serves as Deputy Director of the Office for Humanities and Social Sciences and Executive Director of the Institute for Global Cooperation and Understanding, all at Peking University. He also serves as Standing Council Member of the Chinese Association of American Studies, Member of the Steering Committee of the East Asia Security Forum, Chinese Overseas Educated Scholars Association, International Advisory Committee Member of the Shanghai Academy of Area Studies and Global Governance, and Advisory Committee Member for the Carter Center-Global Times US-China Young Scholars Forum.

Wang Dong received his bachelor's in law from Peking University and M.A. and Ph.D. in political science from University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). Dr. Wang has written extensively on international relations and China's foreign policy. His articles appear in leading academic journals and media outlets such as The Journal of Conflict Resolution, Diplomatic History, The Pacific Review, The Diplomat, and The New York Times. Wang was named a "Munich Young Leader" in 2016 (the only awardee from China); and was selected by the inaugural program of "Preeminent Young Scientists" of Beijing in 2018, one of the most prestigious awards ever given in China.

WANG Jisi

Wang Jisi is an Academic Committee Member of CISS, Tsinghua University and Professor in the School of International Studies and President of the Institute of International and Strategic Studies, Peking University. He is Honorary President of the Chinese Association for American Studies, and was a member of the Foreign Policy Advisory Committee of China's Foreign Ministry in 2008-2016. After working as a laborer in the Chinese countryside in 1968— 1978, Wang Jisi entered Peking University and obtained an MA degree there in 1983. He taught in Peking University's Department of International Politics (1983–1991), and then served as Director of the Institute of American Studies at the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences until 2005. From 2005 to 2013, Wang Jisi served as Dean of the School of International Studies at Peking University. He was concurrently Director of the Institute of International Strategic Studies of the Central Party School of the Communist Party of China from 2001 to 2009.



WU Dahui

Wu Dahui is professor in Department of International Relations, Vice Director of the Russian Institute, Tsinghua University. He is also fellow in Institute of Eurasian Society Development, Development Research Center of the State Council, Senior Advisor on Russian Affairs, China Association for International Friendly Contact, Senior Fellow in Peace and Development Center. His research focuses political, diplomatic and security affairs of the former Soviet Union and the Eastern European region. He has been responsible for important projects for the Department of General Staff, PLA, the National Development Bank, CASS, National Social Science Foundation.



XU Qiyu

Senior Colonel (retired) Xu Qiyu is the senior fellow of National Strategy Institute, Tsinghua University. Before his retirement, he served as deputy director of the Institute for Strategic Studies of National Defense University, China, specializing in regional security and maritime security. He also serves as an advisor or contract research fellow for the Ministry of Defense, Academy for Military Sciences (AMS) and Peking University. In 2003, he was selected as a member of Sino-US Young Leaders Forum. In 2010, he was elected as member of the 11th Committee of All-China Youth Federation. He published quite a few academic articles, focusing on international politics, regional security and classic strategic studies. In 2011, he published Fragile Rise: Grand Strategy and the Fate of Imperial Germany 1871-1914, the copyright of which has been purchased by Harvard University and the English version was published by MIT Press in January 2017, forwarded by Professor Graham Allison, and reviewed in journals as Journal for Strategic Studies, Oxford International Studies Review, Naval War College Review, Orbis, etc.. In 2014 he published his second book----The Formative decade of an Empire: America's 1890-1900.

Sr. Col. (retired) Xu received his M. A. in 2000 in National Defense University, China, and Ph.D in international politics in the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (CASS). He worked as guest researcher in the Institute of Security and Development Policy in Stockholm. He is married and has a son.



XUE Lan

Lan Xue is an Academic Committee Member of CISS, Tsinghua University and a Cheung Kong Chair Distinguished Professor and Dean of Schwarzman College in Tsinghua University. His teaching and research interest include STI policy, crisis management, and global governance. Prof. Xue is also a member of the National Committee for Strategic Consultation and Comprehensive Review, the Chair of China's Expert Committeeon AI Governance for the National New Generation AI Plan, and a Co-Chair of the Leadership Council of the UNSDSN. He is a recipient of the Fudan Distinguished Contribution Award for Management Science.



YAN Xuetong

Yan Xuetong is an Academic Committee Member of CISS, Tsinghua University and a distinguished professor of Tsinghua University and a member of Russia Academy of Sciences. He is serving as the Dean of The Institute of International Relations at Tsinghua University and the Secretary General of the World Peace Forum. He obtained Ph.D. from University of California, Berkeley in1992 and was named as one of world's Top 100 public intellectuals by the American journal Foreign Policy in 2008. He has been the only political scientist listed in Most Cited Chinese Researchers by Elsevier since 2014. Some of his books have been translated into English, Japanese, Korean, Farsi or Albanian.



YAO Yang

Yang Yao is a Cheung-Kong Scholar and Liberal Arts Chair Professor at the China Center for Economic Research (CCER) and the National School of Development (NSD), Peking University. He currently serves as the director of CCER, the dean of NSD, the executive dean of the ISSCAD, and the editor of CCER's house journal China Economic Quarterly. He is a member of China Economist 50 Forum. His research interests include economic transition and development in China. He has published more than hundred research papers in international and domestic journals as well as several books on institutional economics and economic development in China. He is also a prolific writer for magazines and newspapers, including the Financial Times and the Project Syndicate.



YAO Yunzhu

Yao Yunzhu is a Senior Advisor at China Association of Military Sciences and an Academic Committee Member, CISS, Tsinghua University.

She is a retired major general of the People's Liberation Army (PLA) of China, senior advisor to the China Association of Military Sciences and director emeritus of the Center on China-American Defense Relations, the Academy of Military Sciences (AMS). She joined the PLA in 1970, served in the PLA as an Army soldier, a staff officer, an instructor, a researcher, deputy director and director of a research office, and director of a research center. She holds a Master of Arts degree from the PLA's Foreign Languages Institute, a Ph.D. in Military Science from the Academy of Military Sciences. She had been a visiting scholar at the School of Oriental and African Studies, London University, an Eisenhower Fellow and a visiting fellow at Harvard University. She has published books, translated books, articles and papers on international military and security issues, US military affairs, nuclear weapon policy and arms control, and Asia-Pacific security issues. She was a member of the 10th National People's Congress of the PRC, and a member of the 17th Chinese Communist Party Congress.



ZENG Yi

Yi Zeng is a Fellow at CISS, Tsinghua University and a Professor and Deputy Director at Research Center for Brain-inspired Artificial Intelligence, and Co-Director of the China-UK Research Centre for AI Ethics and Governance, both at the Institute of Automation, Chinese Academy of Sciences. He is the founding Director for the Research Center on AI Ethics and Sustainable Development, Beijing Academy of Artificial Intelligence. He is a board member for the National Governance Committee of Next Generation Artificial Intelligence, Ministry of Science and Technology China. He is an Expert in the Ad Hoc Expert Group on Al Ethics, UNESCO. He is in the Expert Group on the Ethics/Governance of Artificial Intelligence in Health, World Health Organization (WHO). He Co-founded the AI4SDGsCooperation Network, and the AI4SDGs Think Tank. He is the lead drafter of Beijing Artificial Intelligence Principles, and one of the major drafters for the National Governance Principles of New Generation Artificial Intelligence, China. His major research interests focus on Brain-inspired Artificial Intelligence, AI Ethics and Governance, and AI for Sustainable Development.



ZHA Daojiong

Zha Daojiong is a professor in the School of International Studies and Institute of South-South Cooperation and Development, Peking University. His areas of expertise include international political economy and China's international economic relations, particularly the fields of energy and natural resources, development aid and the economics-political nexus in the Asia Pacific region. In recent years his research extended to political and social risk management for Chinese corporations engaged in non-financial investments abroad, including the publication of an edited volume Chinese Investment Overseas: case studies on environmental and social risks, Peking University Press, 2014 and Risk Management under the Belt and Road Initiative: economic and societal dimensions, Oceanic Press, 2017).

He is invited to serve as non-resident fellow in a number of public policy think tanks and advisory member on several international exchange associations, including the China chapter of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific (CSPAC) and the China Association for International Exchange.

He joined the faculty of Peking University in 2007 and held prior positions at the Renmin University of China, the International University of Japan and University of Macau. He studied at the East West Center and the University of Hawaii, where he earned a Doctoral degree in political science.



ZHANG Baijia

Zhang Baijia is a historian of History of Chinese Communist Party (CCP) and China's foreign affairs. He is now the member of the Academic Committee at Institute of Modern History, Chinese Academy of Social Sciences(CASS) and Center for Reform and Opening Up History, East China Normal University, and Center for International Security and Strategy, Tsinghua University, is also the Secretary of Zhang Wenjin Scholarship Fund at Peking University. He was Vice-Director of Party History Research Centre attached to The Central Committee of CPC, and elected as Representative of the 11th National Congress and Member of the Legal Committee of the National People's Congress from 2008 to 2013. Mr. Zhang has published many books and articles, such as Research on the Fundamental Thread of China's Diplomacy in 20th Century, History of Reform and Opening Up in China, the Path of the CPC: Revolution, Construction and Reform.



ZHANG Tuosheng

Zhang Tuosheng is a Senior Fellow of the Academic Committee, as well as the former director of the Center for Foreign Policy Studies at the China Foundation for International and Strategic Studies. He is also a council member of the Chinese People's Institute of Foreign Affairs, the Chinese Arms Control and Disarmament Association, the Academy of International and Strategic Studies of Peking University and a member of the Academic Committee of CISS, Tsinghua University. Previously, he was the deputy defense attaché at the Chinese Embassy in the UK, research fellow in the Institute of Strategic Studies of People's Liberation Army (PLA) National Defense University and a lecturer at the PLA Military Collage. His main research interests are China-US relations, China-Japan relations, Asia-Pacific security, security crisis management and China's foreign policy. He has authored or co-authored lots of research publications including papers, reports and books. He earned his master degree from Central Party School of the Communist Party of China.



ZHAO Minghao

Zhao Minghao is Senior Fellow at the Institute of International Studies, Fudan University; Member of China National Committee, Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific (CSCAP); Nonresident Scholar at the Institute of International and Strategic Studies, Peking University; Fellow, CISS, Tsinghua University.

His research focuses on Chinese foreign policy, China-US relations, and Asia-Pacific security. He is author of Strategic Restraint: Is New-type Sino-US Relationship Possible. His new book on the Belt & Road Initiative and China's connectivity-oriented global diplomacy is forthcoming. He has authored over 40 peerreviewed scholarly articles and chapters in books. His opinion pieces have been featured in People's Daily, China Daily, New York Times, Project Syndicate among other prominent outlets. Prior to joining Fudan in 2019, he served as a senior fellow and deputy director for strategic studies at China Center for Contemporary World Studies, the in-house think tank of International Department of the CPC's Central Committee (IDCPC). ZHOU Bo

Senior Colonel Zhou Bo (retired) started his military service in 1979. He served in different posts in Guangzhou Air Force Regional Command. From 1993 he worked successively as staff officer, Deputy Director General of West Asia and Africa Bureau and then Deputy Director General of General Planning Bureau of the Foreign Affairs Office of the Ministry of National Defense of China, Chinese Defense Attaché to the Republic of Namibia and Director of the Centre for Security Cooperation in the Office for International Military Cooperation, Ministry of National Defense. He is now a senior fellow of Center for International Security and Strategy Tsinghua University.

Senior Colonel Zhou Bo has published more than 100 essays and opinions in English in Foreign Affairs, Foreign Policy, Financial Times, The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal, the Australian, South China Morning Post, The Diplomat, Strait Times, China-US Focus and China Daily, etc. He had exclusive interviews with Channel NewsAsia (Singapore), NHK, Russia Today, CNBC and CGTN. He speaks as a PLA delegate at Shangri-La Dialogue in Singapore and at Munich Security conference. He is supervisor to foreign post-graduate officers at PLA National Defense University.

Senior Colonel Zhou Bo is an under-graduate of Air Force Engineering College and a postgraduate of St Edmund College of Cambridge University (MPhil in International Relations). He was a visiting fellow to the Land Warfare Studies Centre of the Australian Army in 1999. He has attended various courses in Harvard University, Westminster University, PLA National Defense University, PLA University of Science and Technology for the National Defense and PLA Army Command College (Shijiazhuang).



ZHU Feng

Zhu Feng is currently Executive Director of China Center for Collaborative Studies of the South China Sea, Nanjing University. He is also Director of the Institute of International Studies at Nanjing University. He writes extensively on regional security in East Asia, the nuclear issue in North Korea, China-US military and diplomatic relations. As a leading Chinese security expert, Professor Zhu's recent book includes International Relations Theory and East Asian Security (2007), China's Ascent: Power, Security, and Future of International politics (co-edited with Professor Robert S. Ross, Cornell University Press 2008), China-Japan Security Cooperation and Defense Communication: the Past, Present, and Future (Coedited with Prof. Akiyama Asahiro, Tokyo: Aiji Press, 2011), and America, China and the Struggle for the World Order (co-edited with Prof. G. John Ikenbery and Prof. Wang jisi, MacMillan, 2015). He sits on a couple of editorial boards of scholarly journals, consults independently for the Chinese government and the private sector, and comments frequently on television and radio and in the print media on Chinese foreign affairs and security policy.





ZOU Ji

Ji Zou, as CEO & President of Energy Foundation China, overall manages the organization.

Ji Zou is a Fellow at CISS, Tsinghua University. He previously served as a deputy director general of China's National Center for Climate Change Strategy and International Cooperation. Between 2012 and 2015 and between 2000 and 2009, Prof. Zou was a key member of the Chinese climate negotiation team leading up to the Paris Agreement. Between 2013 and 2014, he served as a China representative to the United Nations Intergovernmental Committee of Experts on Sustainable Development Financing.

Prof. Zou was a vice dean, professor, and doctoral supervisor at the School of Environment and Natural Resources, Renmin University in Beijing. He holds a bachelor's degree in Environmental Engineering and a master's in Technical Economics, both from Tsinghua University, and a Ph.D. in Resources and Environmental Economics from Renmin University.
