'The Road to Assisi' Roundtable

Context and background:

Global Meetings in Rome and Assisi May 2022

Subject to Covid-19 travel restrictions, the Foundation intends to convene a further global roundtable meeting in Rome in May 2022. In addition, the roundtable will also meet in Assisi, the Italian hill town, for the first time.

Why Assisi? Assisi, already renowned worldwide as the birthplace of St Francis and as a global symbol of peace, has the ambition to become the world capital city of ecology. This ecological vision of the Mayor of Assisi, who is closely affiliated with the Global Foundation, is synonymous with the ideas expressed by Pope Francis in his <u>Laudato Si'</u> encyclical letter of 2015, a landmark statement and call to action on environmental degradation and global warming.

'Road to Assisi' Roundtable

As an Australian stepping-stone to the global meetings in Rome and Assisi next year, the Foundation has agreed, at the invitation of Fr Frank Brennan SJ AO, Rector of Newman College Melbourne, to convene a 'Road to Assisi' Roundtable meeting at the College on 21 October, 2021. Due to anticipated Covid lockdowns, the roundtable will be conducted on line via Zoom.

The roundtable will enable a cross-section of younger Australians, members and guests of the Foundation as well as some special international speakers to engage in discussions which will contribute to the agenda for the global meetings in Rome and Assisi.

The meeting will also enable a focus on practical actions which might be undertaken by those taking part in Melbourne and Australia. 'We are still trying to find a way to get the balance right between global warming, economic development, and a fair go for everyone', stated Father Brennan. 'If we cannot change the world overnight, each of us wants to do their bit, being responsible, individually, communally, and institutionally.'

'Laudato Si' will be the principal background document to inform the 'Road to Assisi' Roundtable at Newman College. Experts on Laudato Si' who are associated with the Vatican will help to guide the meeting. Other global experts associated with action on climate change through the mobilisation of large-scale private sector investments and related business actions, will also contribute to the meeting.
