International Participants



Jude Blanchette

Jude Blanchette holds the Freeman Chair in China Studies at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). Previously, he was engagement director at The Conference Board's China Center for Economics and Business in Beijing, where he researched China's political environment with a focus on the workings of the Communist Party of China and its impact on foreign companies and investors. Prior to working at The Conference Board, Blanchette was the assistant director of the 21st Century China Center at the University of California, San Diego.

Blanchette has written for a range of publications, including *Foreign Affairs* and *Foreign Policy*, and his Chinese translations have appeared in the *Wall Street Journal* and the *Financial Times*. His book, *China's New Red Guards: The Return of Radicalism and the Rebirth of Mao Zedong*, was published by Oxford University Press in 2019.

Blanchette is a public intellectual fellow at the National Committee on United States-China Relations and serves on the board of the American Mandarin Society. He is also a senior advisor at Crumpton Group, a geopolitical risk advisory based in Arlington, Virginia. He holds an M.A. in modern Chinese studies from the University of Oxford and a B.A. in economics from Loyola University in Maryland.



Jennifer Bouey

Jennifer Bouey is a senior policy researcher and the Tang Chair for China Policy Studies at the RAND Corporation. She leads wide-ranged collaborative research initiatives on health, education, and global developments. In the last two years, Dr. Bouey has testified multiple times before Congress, briefed U.S. government officials, and was quoted frequently on China's global health initiatives and US-China public health collaborations by main media channels. Prior to joining RAND, she led an international research workgroup on U.S. and China's health security interests, including pandemic preparedness and global health governance. Dr. Bouey also serve as a professor of policy analysis at RAND Pardee Graduate School and associate professor of global health at the Georgetown University. Her research centered on migrant health and social determinants of health and many projects were funded by NIH, HRSA/HHS, and foundations. Dr. Bouey routinely provide consultations for the World Bank Group, UNAIDS, USAID, Hong Kong Government AIDS Fund, and international NGOs.



CHHEM Kieth Rethy

Professor CHHEM Kieth Rethy is a medical doctor, science diplomat, educator and historian with extended experience in Digital Science & Technology, Global Health Diplomacy, Nuclear Technology Policy, and Executive Education. He holds a MD, a PhD in Education and a PhD in History.

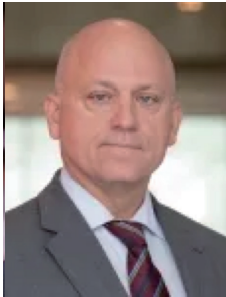
He has published more than 100 scientific articles, edited 17 textbooks and has been invited as a keynote speaker in more than 70 countries.

He was a Professor of Radiology in Canada (McGill), Singapore (NUS), Austria (Vienna Medical University) and Japan (Hiroshima, Nagasaki, Fukushima Medical University) for 30 years. He was the Chair of the Radiology and Nuclear Medicine Department of University of Western Ontario. He was the Director of the Division of Human Health at the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) from 2008 to 2014.



Chung Jaehung

Jae-Hung Chung is a Research Fellow (Department of Security Strategy Studies) of the Sejong Institute in Korea. He received B.A. M.A from Peking University in China (Beijing) and Ph.D. from Chinese Academy of Social Science in China (Beijing). He was an Assistant professor of Kyungnam University (2013-2015), the Institute of Far Eastern Studies (IFES) Analysis (2007-2013) and policy advisor Ministry of National Defence and NIS. He has served as Consulate General of the Republic of Korea Guangzhou in China, Senior Political Researcher (2010-2012). Main research interests include Chinese Security (Defence) and Chinese Non-traditional Security, Sino-North Korea (Sino-South Korea) Security (Defence) relations, Northeast Asian and Korean Peninsula Security (Defence) issue. Recently his research paper and writings include China's Future Military Security Strategy in the Era of U.S.-China Competition (2020), The recent U.S.-China military security competition and the Taiwan Strait crisis (2021) and so on.



Cortez A. Cooper III

Senior International/Defense Researcher; Affiliate Faculty, Pardee RAND Graduate School, RAND Corporation.

Cortez A. Cooper III is a senior international/defense researcher at the RAND Corporation and an affiliate faculty member at the Pardee RAND Graduate School. He provides assessments of security challenges across political, military, economic, cultural, and informational arenas for a broad range of U.S. government clients.

Prior to joining RAND, Cooper was the director of the East Asia Studies Center for Hicks and Associates, Inc. He has also served in the U.S. Navy Executive Service as the senior analyst for the Joint Intelligence Center Pacific, U.S. Pacific Command. As the senior intelligence analyst and Asia.



Joseph DeTrani

Ambassador DeTrani is the former U.S. Special Envoy for the Six-Party Talks with North Korea and the U.S. representative to the Korea Energy Development Organization. He was an Associate Director of National Intelligence, Director of the National Counter Proliferation Center and senior adviser to the Director of National Intelligence. Prior to that, he was an officer in the U.S. Air Force and a member of the Senior Executive Service at the Central Intelligence Agency. He's a professor at Missouri State University's Graduate Department of Defense and Strategic Studies and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and has published and spoken publicly about East Asia and nuclear nonproliferation.



Rafiq Dossani

Rafiq Dossani is director of the RAND Center for Asia Pacific Policy, a senior economist at the RAND Corporation, and a professor of policy analysis at the Pardee RAND Graduate School. He works on education, finance, regional development, security, trade, and technology issues. Recent projects include security in the Korean peninsula, the Belt and Road Initiative, Track II diplomacy between the United States and China, and Asia's democratization.

Previously, Dossani was director of Stanford University's Center for South Asia and a senior research scholar at Stanford University's Institute for International Studies. He holds a Ph.D. in finance from Northwestern University, an M.B.A. from the Indian Institute of Management, Calcutta, and a B.A. in economics from St. Stephen's College, Delhi.



Karl Eikenberry

Karl Eikenberry is a former U.S. Ambassador to Afghanistan and Lieutenant General, U.S. Army (retired). He is a faculty member of Schwarzman College, Tsinghua University, Non-Resident Fellow at the Liechtenstein Institute on Self Determination at Princeton University, and Board Member of the Centre for Humanitarian Dialogue in Geneva, Switzerland.

Previously he was the Director of the U.S.-Asia Security Initiative at the Walter H. Shorenstein Asia-Pacific Research Center, Stanford University.

Prior to his arrival at Stanford, he served as the U.S. Ambassador to Afghanistan from 2009 until 2011. Before appointment as Chief of Mission in Kabul, Ambassador Eikenberry had a thirty-five year career in the United States Army, retiring in April 2009 with the rank of lieutenant general. His military operational posts included commander and staff officer with mechanized, light, airborne, and ranger infantry units in the continental U.S., Hawaii, Korea, Italy, and in Afghanistan as the Commander of the American-led Coalition forces. He held various policy and political-military positions, including Deputy Chairman of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) Military Committee in Brussels, Belgium; Director for Strategic Planning and Policy for U.S. Pacific Command at Camp Smith, Hawaii; U.S. Security Coordinator and Chief of the Office of Military Cooperation in Kabul, Afghanistan; and Assistant Army and later Defense Attaché at the United States Embassy in Beijing, China.

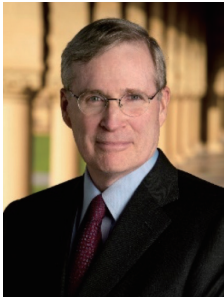


Paul Gewirtz

Paul Gewirtz is the Potter Stewart Professor of Constitutional Law at Yale Law School and also the Director of Yale's Paul Tsai China Center.

The Paul Tsai China Center carries out research and teaching, and also undertakes a wide range of cooperative projects with Chinese counterparts helping advance China's legal reforms and contributing to the development of U.S.-China relations. From 1997-1998, Professor Gewirtz was part of President Bill Clinton's administration, where he served as Special Representative for the Presidential Rule of Law Initiative. In that post, he developed and led the U.S.-China initiative to cooperate in the legal field agreed to at the 1997 and 1998 Summit meetings between President Clinton and China's President Jiang Zemin.

Professor Gewirtz was also the founder of Yale Law School's Global Constitutionalism Seminar, which brings leading Supreme Court judges from around the world to Yale each year. Before joining the Yale faculty, Professor Gewirtz served as law clerk to Justice Thurgood Marshall of the United States Supreme Court and practiced law in Washington, D.C. He is a member of the American Law Institute and the Council on Foreign Relations. He received his B.A. degree summa cum laude from Columbia University and his law degree from Yale.



Stephen Hadley

Stephen Hadley is a principal of Rice, Hadley, Gates & Manuel LLC, an international strategic consulting firm founded with Condoleezza Rice, Robert Gates, and Anja Manuel. Mr. Hadley is also Board Chair of the United States Institute of Peace (USIP) and an Executive Vice Chair of the Board of Directors of the Atlantic Council. Mr. Hadley served for four years as the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs from 2005 to 2009. From 2001 to 2005, Mr. Hadley was the Assistant to the President and Deputy National Security Advisor, serving under then National Security Advisor Condoleezza Rice. Mr. Hadley had previously served on the National Security Council staff and in the Defense Department including as Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Policy from 1989 to 1993. During his professional career, Mr. Hadley has served on a number of corporate and advisory boards, including: the National Security Advisory Panel to the Director of Central Intelligence, the Department of Defense Policy Board, and the State Department's Foreign Affairs policy Board. He is a member of the Aspen Strategy Group.



Steve Howard

As Founding Secretary General of the non-profit Global Foundation since 1998, Steve Howard has led the necessary global push for the adoption of ‘co-operative globalisation’ , a positive strategy for inclusive, ‘win-win’ economic development and a sustainable global economy. Many world leaders have personally participated in and endorsed this and related initiatives.

Through this collaborative and low-key approach, Steve has helped to shape global affairs with practical outcomes over more than 20 years. Prior to the Global Foundation, he led the successful renaissance strategy for Melbourne, in Australia in the 1990’ s, including a national strategy for private sector investment in public infrastructure, now adopted as a business model, worldwide.



Wolfgang Ischinger

Ambassador (ret.) Wolfgang Ischinger is the President of the Foundation Council of the Munich Security Conference Foundation. He served as Chairman of the Munich Security Conference (MSC) from 2008 to 2022. Ischinger teaches at the Hertie School in Berlin as Senior Professor for Security Policy and Diplomatic Practice. Under his leadership, the MSC grew as organization from 2 to more than 50 staff members, and increased its budget from 0,5 to ca. 10 million Euros, funded via corporate partnerships and international sponsors. He advises the private sector, governments, and international organizations on strategic issues. He has published widely on foreign, security and defense policy issues.

Wolfgang Ischinger is a member of the Trilateral Commission and the European Council on Foreign Relations (ECFR) and serves on a number of non-profit boards and advisory councils, including the German Council on Foreign Relations (DGAP), the American Academy Berlin, as well as the Atlantik-Brücke and the Yalta European Strategy Group (YES). He also serves on the International Advisory Council of Investcorp, London.



Sergey A. Karaganov

Sergey A. Karaganov: Dr.Hab (History), Scientific Head of the Faculty (School) of International Economics and Foreign Affairs of the National Research University Higher School of Economics, Honorary Chairman of the Presidium of the Council on Foreign and Defense Policy. He has authored and edited more than 25 books and around 500 articles. Some of his positions include: Member of the Academic Council of the MFA of Russia, Member of the Academic and Advisory Council, Russian Security Council, Member of the Council for the Development of Civil Society and Human Rights under the President of Russia. In 1990s he was the member of the Presidential Council of Russia. In 2014-2015 Sergei Karaganov was a member of the High-level Panel of Eminent Persons on European Security as a Common Project under the OSCE. Dr. Lee previously served as an Assistant Professor at the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS), Nanyang Technological University, Singapore.



Lee Sang Hyun

Sang Hyun Lee is President of the Sejong Institute in Korea. He also serves as President of the Korea Nuclear Policy Society (KNPS). He received his B.A. and M.A. from Seoul National University and Ph.D. from the Department of Political Science at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign in 1999.

He was a research fellow at the Korean Institute for International Studies (1987-88), the Korea Institute for Defense Analysis (1988-90), and policy advisor for Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of National Unification, and Ministry of National Defense. He has served as Director-General for Policy Planning, Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA) from May 2011 to April 2013. He is a member of Asia-Pacific Leadership Network (APLN) for Nuclear Nonproliferation and Disarmament, and Korea-US Nuclear Policy Leadership Initiative (NPLI). He has been a visiting scholar at Institute for Development and Security (ISDP) in Stockholm, Sweden, and Stimson Center in Washington DC.

His main research interests include international politics and security, Korea-U.S. relations, inter-Korean relations, nuclear security and nonproliferation, and East Asian security issues. His recent publications include: “Prospects for the Biden Administration’ s Foreign Policy” (2021), South Korea’ s Foreign Policy in the Era of U.S.-China Strategic Competition (2020, co-authored), “Trump Administration’ s Nuclear Policy: Implications for Global Nuclear Energy and North Korean Nuclear Issue” (2019), “Trump Administration’ s National Security Policy and Its Implications for Global Order and Korean Peninsula” (2018), Trump Administration and ROK-US Relations (2017, co-authored), North Korea under Kim Jong-un: Evaluating Past Five Years (2017, co-authored), and so on.



Cheng Li

Cheng Li is Director and Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution's John L. Thornton China Center. Dr. Li is also a director of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, a Distinguished Fellow of the Munk School of Global Affairs and Public Policy at University of Toronto, a nonresident fellow at Yale University's Paul Tsai China Center, and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. Li's research areas include the transformation of political leaders, generational change, the Chinese middle class, technological development in China, and U.S.-China relations.

He is the author/editor of numerous books, including *Rediscovering China: Dynamics and Dilemmas of Reform* (1997), *China's Leaders: The New Generation* (2001), *Bridging Minds Across the Pacific: The Sino-US Educational Exchange* (2005), *China's Changing Political Landscape* (2008), *China's Emerging Middle Class* (2010), *China's Political Development: Chinese and American Perspectives* (2014), *Chinese Politics in the Xi Jinping Era: Reassessing Collective Leadership* (2016), *The Power of Ideas: The Rising Influence of Thinkers and Think Tanks in China* (2017), and *Middle Class Shanghai: Reshaping U.S.-China Engagement* (2021). He is currently completing a book manuscript with the working title *Rising Elite Groups in the Chinese Leadership*. He is the principal editor of the Thornton Center Chinese Thinkers Series published by the Brookings Institution Press. Li received an M.A. in Asian Studies from the University of California at Berkeley and a Ph.D. in Political Science from Princeton University.



Bonny Lin

Bonny Lin is a senior fellow for Asian security and director of the China Power Project at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). Previously, she was the acting associate director of the Strategy and Doctrine Program of RAND Project AIR FORCE and a political scientist at the RAND Corporation, where she analyzed different aspects of U.S. competition with China, including U.S.-China competition for influence in the Indo-Pacific and China's use of gray zone tactics against U.S. allies and partners. Her research advised senior leaders in the Department of Defense, including military leaders at U.S. Pacific Air Forces and U.S. Army Pacific. Dr. Lin also served in the Office of the Secretary of Defense from 2015 to 2018, where she was director for Taiwan, country director for China, and senior adviser for China.

Dr. Lin holds a PhD in political science from Yale University, a master's degree in Asian studies with a focus on China from the University of Michigan, and a bachelor's degree in government from Harvard College. While pursuing her master's, she interned at CSIS.



Fyodor Lukyanov

Fyodor Lukyanov was an international journalist in 1990-2002. He collaborated with numerous newspapers, radio and television broadcasters. Since 2002, he has been the Editor-in-Chief of the Russia in Global Affairs journal. In 2012, Lukyanov was appointed as the Chairman of the Presidium of the Council on Foreign and Defense Policy – one of the oldest Russian NGOs.

Since 2015, Fyodor Lukyanov has been the Research Director of the Foundation for Development and Support of the Valdai Discussion Club.



Michael McFaul

Michael McFaul is the Director and Senior Fellow at the Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies; the Ken Olivier and Angela Nomellini Professor of International Studies in Political Science; and the Peter and Helen Bing Senior Fellow at the Hoover Institution, all at Stanford University. He was also the Distinguished Mingde Faculty Fellow at the Stanford Center at Peking University from June to August of 2015. He joined the Stanford faculty in 1995. Ambassador McFaul is also an analyst for NBC News and a contributing columnist to The Washington Post.

Ambassador McFaul served for five years in the Obama administration, first as Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for Russian and Eurasian Affairs at the National Security Council at the White House (2009-2012), and then as U.S. Ambassador to the Russian Federation (2012-2014). He has authored several books, including most recently the New York Times bestseller, *From Cold War to Hot Peace: An American Ambassador in Putin's Russia*. He is currently writing a book on great powers relations in the 21st century.



Erik Mobrand

Erik Mobrand is Korea Policy Chair and a senior political scientist at the RAND Corporation. He studies political transformation in Asia with Korea as a central reference point. Mobrand is the author of *Top-Down Democracy in South Korea* (University of Washington Press, 2019) and articles on topics including corruption, political parties, law and politics, criminality, gender and politics, management of cities, and Korean relations with Southeast Asia. In 2016, Mobrand joined Seoul National University as an associate professor in the Graduate School of International Studies. He previously served as assistant professor of political science at National University of Singapore. He received a Ph.D. in politics from Princeton University.



Moon Chung-in

Chung-in Moon is chairman of the Sejong Institute, a leading private think tank, in South Korea and is a distinguished professor at National Defense University. He is also Krause distinguished fellow at School of Global Policy and Strategy at the University of California, San Diego, and editor-in-chief of Global Asia, a quarterly journal in English. He is Vice Chairman of APLN (Asia-Pacific Leadership Network for Nuclear Disarmament and Non-Proliferation). He was a special advisor to the ROK president for foreign affairs and national security (May 2017 to February 2021). He was dean of the Graduate School of International Studies, Yonsei Univ. and served as Ambassador for International Security Affairs of the Korean Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade and Chairman of the Presidential Committee on Northeast Asian Cooperation Initiative, a cabinet-level post. Dr. Moon was a special delegate to the first (2000), second (2007), third Korean summit (2018) held in Pyongyang. He also served as president of the Korea Peace Studies Association and Vice President of the International Studies Association (ISA) of North America.

He has published over 60 books and 300 articles in edited volumes and scholarly journals. His recent publications include Moon Chung-in's Future Scenario: Covid-19, US-China New Cold War, and South Korea's Choice (2021, in Korean), Bridging the Divide: Moon Jae-in's Korean Peace Initiative (2019), and Routledge Handbook of Korean Politics and Administration (2019). He also served as president of the Korea Peace Studies Association and Vice President of the International Studies Association (ISA) of North America. He was also chairman of the Global Agenda Council on the Future of Korea of the World Economic Forum. He is a recipient of Public Policy Award (Woodrow Wilson International Center), the Lixian Scholarship (Beijing University), and Pacific Leadership Fellowship (Univ. of California, San Diego).



Stephen A. Orlins

Stephen A. Orlins has been president of the National Committee since 2005. Prior to that, he was the managing director of Carlyle Asia and the chairman of the board of Taiwan Broadband Communications, one of Taiwan's largest cable television and high speed internet providers. Prior to joining Carlyle, Mr. Orlins was a senior advisor to AEA Investors Inc., a New York based leveraged buyout firm, with responsibility for AEA's business activities throughout Asia.

From 1983 to 1991, Mr. Orlins was with the investment banking firm of Lehman Brothers where he was a Managing Director from 1985 to 1991. From 1987 to 1990, he served as President of Lehman Brothers Asia. Based in Hong Kong, he supervised over 150 professionals with offices in Hong Kong, Korea, China, Taiwan, Thailand, Manila and Singapore. Prior to joining Lehman Brothers, Mr. Orlins practiced law with Coudert Brothers and Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison in New York, Hong Kong and Beijing.

From 1976 to 1979, Mr. Orlins served in the Office of the Legal Advisor of the United States Department of State, first in the Office of the Assistant Legal Advisor for Political-Military Affairs and then for East Asian and Pacific Affairs. While in that office, he was a member of the legal team that helped establish diplomatic relations with the People's Republic of China.

Mr. Orlins is a magna cum laude graduate of Harvard College and earned his law degree at Harvard Law School. He speaks Mandarin Chinese and is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

In 1992, Mr. Orlins was the Democratic nominee for the United States Congress in New York's Third Congressional District.



Douglas H. Paal

Douglas H. Paal is a distinguished fellow at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He previously served as vice chairman of JPMorgan Chase International (2006–2008) and was an unofficial U.S. representative to Taiwan as director of the American Institute in Taiwan (2002–2006). He was on the National Security Council staffs of Presidents Reagan and George H. W. Bush between 1986 and 1993 as director of Asian Affairs and then as senior director and special assistant to the president.

Paal held positions in the policy planning staff at the State Department, as a senior analyst for the CIA, and at U.S. embassies in Singapore and Beijing. He has spoken and published frequently on Asian affairs and national security issues.



Susan Shirk

Susan Shirk is research professor and the founding chair of the 21st Century China Center, a unique academic research center and university-based policy think tank at the School of Global Policy and Strategy, UC San Diego. She is the author of many books, including most notably *The Political Logic of Economic Reform in China* and *China: Fragile Superpower*. Her new book *Overreach: How China Derailed its Peaceful Rise* will be published Fall 2022.

Shirk co-chairs a task force of China experts that issued its third report “China’s New Direction: Challenges and Opportunities for U.S. Policy” in September 2021. She is also co-chair of the UC San Diego Forum on U.S.-China Relations, an ongoing high-level forum focused entirely on the U.S.-China relationship. She received the 2021 Joseph J. Kruzel Memorial Award of the American Political Science Association for her distinguished career in national security affairs as an academic and public servant.



Yun Sun

Yun Sun is a Senior Fellow and Co-Director of the East Asia Program and Director of the China Program at the Stimson Center. Her expertise is in Chinese foreign policy, U.S.-China relations and China's relations with neighboring countries and authoritarian regimes.

From 2011 to early 2014, she was a Visiting Fellow at the Brookings Institution, jointly appointed by the Foreign Policy Program and the Global Development Program, where she focused on Chinese national security decision-making processes and China-Africa relations. From 2008 to 2011, Yun was the China Analyst for the International Crisis Group based in Beijing, specializing on China's foreign policy towards conflict countries and the developing world. Prior to ICG, she worked on U.S.-Asia relations in Washington, DC for five years. Yun earned her master's degree in international policy and practice from George Washington University, as well as an MA in Asia Pacific studies and a BA in international relations from Foreign Affairs College in Beijing.



Christopher Thomas

Chris Thomas is the founder of Integrated Insights, an advisory firm serving the CEOs of major semiconductor and technology companies; a Board Director and Chair of the Audit Committee at Velodyne LIDAR, a leading autonomous driving company; a member of the Council on Foreign Relations; a Visiting Professor at Tsinghua University; and a non-resident Senior Fellow in Artificial Intelligence and Emerging Technologies at the Brookings Institution.

Chris spent ten years as a partner with McKinsey & Company, leaving the Firm in 2020. He served as Managing Partner for the Firm's Asia Semiconductor Practice as well as its Co-Managing Partner for the global Digital Strategy and IOT service lines. He led hundreds of engagements on strategy, corporate finance, digital, sales and product development topics for global semiconductor, device, system, and cloud companies. McKinsey ranked Chris among the top 10% of global partners in three of his final four years at the Firm.

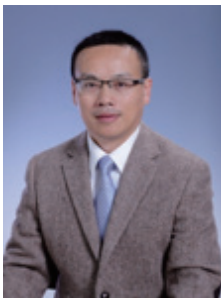

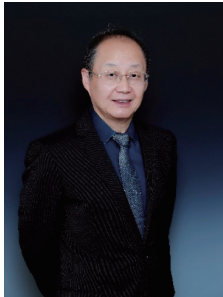
FU Ying

Fu Ying is the Founding Chairperson of CISS and Former Vice Foreign Minister of the People's Republic of China.

Fu Ying started her career with China's Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA) in 1978 and had long engaged in Asian affairs. She served successively as Director of Division and Counselor in Asian Affairs Department of MFA. In 1992 She joined UN peacekeeping mission in Cambodia. She was appointed Minister Counselor at Chinese Embassy in Indonesia in 1997, Chinese Ambassador to the Philippines in 1998, and Director General of Asian Department of MFA in 2000. She then was appointed Ambassador to Australia (2004-2007), and Ambassador to the United Kingdom (2007-2009). She served as Vice Minister of Foreign Affairs for European Affairs and then for Asian Affairs (2009-2013).

Fu Ying was elected deputy to China's 12th (2013) and then 13th (2018) National People's Congress (NPC). She was the Chairperson of the Foreign Affairs Committee and spokesperson of the 12th NPC (2013-2018). She is now a Vice-Chairperson of the Foreign Affairs Committee of China's 13th NPC (2018-2023).

Fu Ying also served as the Chair of Center for International Security and Strategy (CISS) and appointed an adjunct professor at Tsinghua University from 2018 to 2021.



FANG Ning

Fang Ning is a political scientist, an expert in philosophy and social science in China's Thousand Talents Plan, and the former Director and Secretary of the Party Committee of the Institute of Political Science at the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, where he is also a researcher. He is a Chair Professor at Sichuan University.

In his long academic career in political theory and practice, Professor Fang has participated in many important research projects and in writing theoretical works for state ministries. In September 2010, he gave a lecture titled On the Correct Handling of Contradictions Among the People in the New Era at the 23rd collective study session of the Politburo of the 17th Central Committee of the Communist Party of China (CPC), and in April 2013, he gave a lecture on Anti-Corruption and Integrity in the History of China at the 5th Politburo collective study session of the 18th CPC Central Committee.

Professor Fang has always been committed to the pursuit of learning with his feet on the ground—in 2017, he visited the Beijing-Hangzhou Grand Canal on foot, and in 2021, he embarked on a field study of the Aihui-Tengchong Line.



HU Bo

Hu Bo is Director of the Center for Maritime Strategy Studies and Research Professor at the Institute of Ocean Research, Peking University and Fellow of CISS, Tsinghua University. His areas of specialization include maritime strategy, international security, and Chinese diplomacy. He has written three books and more than 40 journal articles and book chapters on topics related to China's maritime strategy and policy. His representative works include *China's Maritime Power in 2049* (Beijing, China Development Press, 2015); *China's Sea Power in the Post Mahan Era* (Beijing, Ocean Press, 2018); and *Chinese Maritime Power in the 21st Century* (Routledge, 2019).



HUANG Jing

Prof. Dr. HUANG Jing is University Professor and Director of Center for American and Pacific Studies at Shanghai International Studies University (SISU), founding partner of Transcend Consulting. Prof. Huang also taught at Harvard University as an instructor in 1993-94. Prof Huang is a Richard von Weizsäcker Fellow at Bosch Academy in Germany since 2013. Prof. Huang' s main research and teaching interests include security in Asia-Pacific, US-China relations, security in Asia-Pacific, Chinese elite politics, China' s foreign policy and its development strategy.



HUANG Renwei

Huang Renwei is the Executive Director-General, Fudan Institute for Belt and Road and Global Governance; Academic Committee Member, CISS, Tsinghua University. He is the former Vice President of Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences, Senior Fellow for international studies; Chairman, Think Tank Research Center; Secretary-general of World Forum for China Studies. He is also Vice Chairman of Chinese Association of International relations, Chairman of Shanghai Association For American Studies, Senior fellow of Cross Strait Research Center. He published many books and articles on Global governance, Sino-US relations, Belt and Road Initiatives, International trade and Cross Strait relations. His books including *The Time and Space of China's Rise* (2002) have been widely quoted; and participated in many track II strategic dialogues between China and US.



JIA Qingguo
