# Opening remarks from Steve Howard, Secretary General of the Global Foundation

As you know, the Global Foundation has, for many years, acted as a global civil society platform, to enable like-minded leaders from many backgrounds to meet from time to time, in significant locations, to discuss some of the most pressing issues facing the world.

Our approach is based upon leadership by 'business, with purpose', in full partnership with civil society, faiths, institutions and governments.

Our Global Project, 'Shaping Global Governance, Climate and Nature', was launched in Rome in June 2024

Our <u>Rome Roundtable</u> continued our tradition over the past 27 years of bringing together leaders from many backgrounds in various global locations, including the Vatican. Several of our Rome meetings included meetings with His Holiness, the late Pope Francis. This Latin American Pope, from the global South, constantly embraced and encouraged our work. It was a very special patronage and privilege.

In Rome last year, we launched our <u>Global Project</u>, to help shape global governance to generate action and private sector leadership and partnership on climate change and the preservation of nature.



Late last year, Gustavo said to me: 'Steve, why don't we together convene a global roundtable meeting at Carajás in the Amazon, so that we can help Brazil as it finalises its preparations to host COP30 later this year? Vale can also demonstrate its commitment to being a leader in this transformation. At the same time, we can build a stronger connection between Brazil and the world going forward and vice versa.' So, here we are, in Carajás! I was deeply impressed when I visited your country in May, to meet with senior figures in government, business, civil society, faiths and institutions.

In my view and in the view of the Global Foundation as a whole, Brazil has so much to offer the world as we face up to the challenges of preserving our planet and ensuring a sustainable energy transition. The Amazon, which is facing a tipping point, belongs to Brazil and surrounding nations, however it also belongs to the world. As goes the Amazon, so goes the future of our life on earth.

#### **Hopes and Expectations**
